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City of Walthourville Mayor and Council Meeting Minutes January 11, 2022 @ 6:00 PM Walthourville Police Department

- I. Call to Order: The meeting was called to order by Mayor Larry D. Baker at 6:00 PM.
- II. Roll Call was taken by the City Clerk with the following members present:

The attendance of council constituted a quorum.

- III. Invocation: was given by Mayor Larry D. Baker.
- IV. Pledge of Allegiance was recited in unison.
- V. Adoption of City Council Agenda: The motion to approve the agenda was made by Councilwoman Lovette and the second was provided by Mayor Pro Tem Hayes.

 Vote: 5-0: Motion Carried.
- VI. Adoption of City Council Minutes:

December 14, 2021 Regular Minutes: Councilwoman Lovette requested to amend the minutes, page 3 under Parks and Recreation. She stated that Mayor Pro Tem Hayes did not say anything about EPA. Also, she said she was not present to vote on LCPC Item #4, the mobile home permit for Mr. Michael Hemingway. The motion to approve was made by Mayor Pro Tem Hayes and the second was provided by Councilman Anderson.

Vote: 4-0: Motion Carried

Councilwoman Lovette refused to vote.

December 28, 2021 Special Called Meeting for FY 2022 Budget Adoption: The minutes were not approved with the voting as follows: Vote: 2-3: Motion Denied. Voting favorably was: Mayor Pro Tem Hayes and Councilman Hendry Voting Opposingly: Councilwomen Kelly, Lovette and Councilman Anderson.

VII. Presentation/Information: The Honorable Commissioner Gary Gillard Liberty County 5th District Commissioner, Mr. Gary Gilliard orated to Mayor and Council that he shares the Walthourville District with Commissioner Marion Stevens. Commissioner Gillard stated that there are two state highways that run through Walthourville, which are Highway 84 and State Highway 119. He stated there are a myriad of dirt roads in Walthourville and the county helps maintain those roads with

through an intergovernmental agreement. He further stated to grade the dirt roads, some of the roads are private property and require easements. Without the easements giving access, they cannot venture on private property. He named several of the dirt roads in Walthourville which includes Kent, Community, Doby, Wilder, Sanders, Phenela, Emily Cooke, Russell and McCarty Lane (just to name a few). He also stated that the county supplements animal control in Walthourville. He further stated he is aware of the drainage problem on Rivers Road and that he and Mayor Baker has spoken about the problem and they are working on a solution. Commissioner Gillard stated he currently has SPLOST Funds available, and he will have more SPLOST Funding to assist the city. With the dirt roads he suggested, graveling, or milling and that he would be able to incur some of the cost.

He also stated the county has purchased a street sweeper and he can add Walthourville to the list. On Carter Road, the county's services will include curbing and gutter. He suggested on Cato Lane, milling can be used, and the remaining dirt roads possibly crush and run. Mayor Pro Tem Hayes stated the Oakridge Subdivision has very bad flooding (heavy rainfall) and she wanted to know what assistance can the county provide? Commissioner Gillard stated, it would require an easement of all homeowners because their homes are private property. There might be several homeowners on one street that doesn't want their yard dug (destroyed because perhaps they have centipede grass growing) or torn apart and therefore without a consensus the county will not be able to do anything. She stated, she was willing to go to all 108 homes in the area and see if anyone objected. Councilwoman Lovette stated she has had citizens call her about the Smiley Road area with the flooding when it rains heavily. The commissioner stated the same scenario he gave about Oakridge Commissioner Gillard stated he is committed to assisting the city and he would like for elected officials only to call the Commissioners office when there is a drainage/flooding road issue.

VIII. Agenda Items

1. LCPC
Mr. Ricketson presented a conditional use petition for Ms. Cynthis Berrios to operate a family daycare at her residence located at 133 Fletcher Road as a Type B Home Occupation. This property is described as LCTM-Parcel 050A-014. Councilwoman Lovette asked about the fencing at the property whether it would be a wooden or chain link fence. Mr. Ricketson stated a privacy fence was already erected at the property. The motion to approve was made by Councilwoman Lovette with the second provided by Councilman Hendry.

Vote: 5-0: Motion Carried.

Mayor Baker asked Mr. Ricketson to address the Council pertaining to sidewalks on Busbee Road.

Mr. Ricketson stated that the City of Walthourville participates in Liberty Transit and the transit authority has money for sidewalks that will not impose a cost to the city. He stated, "this project has been in the works for a long time." This project

will provide 5 foot of sidewalk that will align with Parkers Convenience Store. He stated that his project will cost \$80,000 and Trent Long with T.R. Long Engineering is the engineer.

IX. Council Comments

Councilmembers

Fire Department Councilman Charlie L. Anderson, Sr. Interim Chief Gary Fairchild stated all is going well with the Fire Department, "we are 11 days in the new year and the department has answered 29 calls." They are maintaining call volume and working on patching the roof. Councilwoman Lovette stated she had received information that Mayor Baker was giving the Fire Department to Long County and this information came from a credible source. Mayor Baker stated he has not given the Fire Department to Long County.

Economic Development Mayor Pro Tem Sarah B. Hayes Reported that bring one for the chipper was held on January 8th, 2022 in conjunction with KLB. She attended an MLK Breakfast, and the recycle fair is in February and the Shred-It Truck will be located at City Hall. The city's first food drive will be in March.

Public Works

Reported that Public Works is going well. Due to the holidays, trash/bulk trash pickup has been heavy, and the department is working to clear all trash and debris. Councilwoman Lovette interjected and said she was thinking about another piece of equipment that was at Public Works when she repeatedly asked about ditch cleaning equipment. Councilman Hendry said it was the jetter (Water Department) instead of equipment to clean ditches.

Water Department Councilwoman Bridgette Kelly Gave the water department statistics, which were 109 work orders processed and generated from December 14th, 2021-January 10th, 2022. The city had 25 trash connections, 18 sewer connections and 28 water connections. Also, Mayor Baker reported that Hampton Ridge Subdivision was experiencing low water pressures. The problem was there are roots close to the water lines and it will take drilling through the sidewalk to rectify the problem. LCPC Executive Director, Mr. Jeff Ricketson stated their engineers provided the inspection to that area. He would send the engineer out to assess the problem and provide feedback to Mayor Baker. Mayor Baker stated to fix this problem is very costly. Councilwoman Lovette stated the mayor and council need to revisit the policy of the city incurring this cost. Mayor Baker said this is part of the problem with the lines and it will cost a lot of money. The preliminary quote that Mr. Turnipseed gave was around 3 million dollars. Councilwoman Kelly asked when the city was getting ARPA (American Rescue Plan Act) funds? Mayor Baker asked City Clerk Moss and she stated the city has received ARPA funds in the amount of \$768, thousand dollars (to be exact \$768,345.50).

Parks and Recreation

Councilwoman Luciria L. Lovette

State that the debris that is buried at the park is called brownstone. There are grants available for brownstone and that the city should apply for these grants. She would like City Grant Writer Bonnie Kelly to look into this. She is still researching a splash pad at Johnnie Frasier.

Police Department

Mayor Larry D. Baker



Serve as member of the Hunter Army Airfield Fire and Emergency Services that is responsible for the life safety of over 5000 soldiers and civilian employees. Protect over 280,000 acre of installation assets and crash protection for 11,375 of runway, as well as 350 acres of aircraft parking.

Have been assigned in the last 8 months to the position of acting captain on both the structural and crash units in absent of the shift captain. When assigned as acting captain I was in charge of shift personnel to include shift training, fire ground operations, and daily station duties. Was also responsible for inputting shift training, run reports, and schedule changes into the appropriate computer formats.

I have been assigned as the EMS Coordinator for Hunter Army Airfield newly started EMS first responder program. I have help reorganizing the equipment on all units, established response procedures, and help rewrite the EMS protocols that govern our response to EMS calls.

Have been assigned as the CPR coordinator for the Hunter Army Airfield Fire Department and have been lead instructor for EMS class for NREMT refresher. Also lead shift training for airfield and fire ground operations.

Have been assigned to the departments fit testing program, NFIRS reporting system, and the NFPA 1500 committee. Also, have been task with revising the departments Incident Action Plans for high hazard buildings on the Hunter Army Airfield Installation.

Perform a full range of firefighting duties as part of a crew for protection of life and property. Firefighting duties include fires that involve structures, equipment, facilities, aircraft, and bulk storage fuels. Perform crash rescue operations involving predominantly large frame and complex military aircraft. I have responded to a least 8 inflight emergences in my two years at Hunter Army Airfield. I continually study response procedures and TOs for all aircraft that is stationed or transit to Hunter Army Airfield. Provide firefighting protection for large quantities of fuel stored and for extensive movements of highly flammable and combustible fuels as well as explosive ordnances. Provide stand-by operations for defueling and medical evacuation patient transfers.

Assigned to operate all types of fire department vehicles such as Engines, Crash Trucks, Rescue Units, and Aerials. Been responsible for making sure of the safe arrival of apparatus and personnel to calls and training actives. Been responsible for operating fire apparatus at active fire scenes and training events. Been assigned to inspect and maintain all fire apparatus and equipment to make sure they are mission ready.

Assist in identifying the response objectives for hazardous materials incidents to include all available potential actions with incident command level competency. Collect and interpret hazard and response information from printed resources, technical resources, computer databases, and monitoring equipment. Utilize risk assessment techniques to form a complete hazardous materials incident analysis and identify the response objectives for a incident.

Employ a variety of established emergency medical techniques, methods, and equipment to stabilize patients. Perform initial and on-going focused patient assessments and physical exams to determine priority of patient care. Manage respiratory and cardiac emergencies to include performing CPR and using an automatic external defibrillator. Administer first aid and oxygen at the EMT level in support of the installation's emergency medical services.

Help distribute and balance the workload among employees to assure timely completion of assigned task. Also help with day-to-day adjustments in accordance with established priorities to obtain mission readiness for the department. Maintain records of work accomplishments and time expanded to prepare production reports as requested. Assist the shift personnel with proper maintenance of apparatus and equipment to insure readiness for fire ground operations. Help with station and grounds upkeep and readiness.

I have also helped with data research and reports for items such as, overtime analysis, schedule changes, and manpower movement. All data to be forwarded to Chief officers for upper-level management briefs.

I also teach all classes for the county and for other counties in the area to help other departments meet their needs.

Severed as a member of the Fort Greely Fire and Emergency services team that was responsible for the fire and life safety protection of a military installation that covered 169 sq. miles. The department was also responsible for all fire response and motor vehicle accidents for 90 miles off the installation. Also the department was responsible for Allen Army Airfield crash protection. Allen Army Airfield was a training airfield and supply strip for the missile command. It also was a private airstrip for the local community. Allen Army Airfield is 9000 ft and handle large frame and fighter air traffic. The Airfield was also the reloading station for all wildland firefighting aircraft.

From 2011 to 2013 I spend 40% of my shifts as acting captain of both the engine company and Crash Crew. I was responsible for all shift personnel and reports. Lead training exercises and multi-company drills in both structural and crash fire ground operations.

In 2011 I was placed in charge of the departments property book till I left the department in 2013. I was responsible for 3.7 million dollars of department assets with 0 deficiency over 2 years. I also perform a full range firefighting duty as part of a crew for protection of life and property. Firefighting duties include fires that involve structures, equipment, facilities, aircraft, and bulk storage fuels. Perform crash rescue operations involving predominantly large frame and complex military aircraft. Provide firefighting protection for large quantities of fuel stored and for extensive movements of highly flammable and combustible fuels as well as explosive ordnances. Part of my responsibilities was to respond to both Fire and EMS First Responder calls on the installation and Mutual aid Fire calls off post. Calls included shipboard fires, Haz-Mat, Confined Space, and Structural fire response. I would also respond to EMS calls as our EMS unit was provided by the County off the installation. Call such as cardiac arrest, respiratory, heat related injuries, and suicides.

40% off my time was spent as a driver operator for all fire department vehicles. Duties included truck checking and maintenances, responded to fire and ems calls, and apparatus set up on scene. As a driver I was also responsible for maintenances records and communicating with the maintenance shop to handle repairs.

15% of my time was spent acting up as the station captain when needed. My duties included handle daily assignments of personnel. I was responsible for all station reports to include training, shift log, and daily brief to the on-duty chief. I was task with on scene command of fire and ems calls and responsibly for crew safety.

106 Hrs./bi-weekly Charleston Fire Department Charleston, South Carolina

The Charleston fire department provides fire protection and emergency medical services to the city of Charleston and its mutual aid areas. In all the department is responsible for an area of 109 square miles with over 130,000 residents. The department has 17 stations broken into 4 battalions. The department responds to about 24,000 calls per year to include fire, Ems, HAZ-MAT, and USAR. The area of response is made up of residents, commercial, industrial, and waterways. The department also responds to mutual aid request with outline areas.

September 2002 till March 2007 (Captain)

Was promoted to station captain in September of 2002 and severed as such till I took a new job with the DOD. I severed as the captain on the engine, truck, and rescue companies. Duties included managing the station I was assigned to, ordering all supplies for the station, handle shift training and reports. I was also in charged of shift personnel to include time keeping, leave and disciplinary issue. I also stepped up to the battalion chief slot when needed. Battalion Chief slot required me to be in charge of a district which included 5 stations and 35 personnel.

February 1999 till September 2002 (Engineer)

Was promoted to the position of Engineer. With this assignment I was placed as the driver of all types of fire apparatus to include engines, ladders, and rescue units. As the engineer it was my job to make sure that the assigned unit was ready to respond to all calls in the city by doing truck checks, equipment run ups, and minor maintenance. Also had to report all issues to the city maintenance shop to have repairs done. I had to maintain all maintenance reports and issue a yearly report to the maintenance chief. I was also task with taken on scene information to be placed in the fire report.

May 1997 till February 1999 (SR. Firefighter/ ASST. Engineer)

Was promoted to SR Firefighter/ ASST. Engineer in May. I was responsible for training the firefighters and probationary firefighters assigned to my shift. It was my job to make sure the probationary firefighters were ready to test for firefighter and that the firefighters were ready to test for SR. Firefighter. This included both practical and written exams. Also responded to fire and Ems calls and acted at the direction of the unit captain.

June 1996 till May 1997 (Firefighter)

Was move out of probationary status and was place on the engine as a firefighter. As a firefighter I was responsible for riding in the nozzle mans set on the engine. I would do handline deployment on fires and was second EMT on medical calls. Acted under the direct supervision of the engine captain. Was required to assist the probationary firefighters due training for their promotion test. Also help the probationary firefighters with daily station duties and clean up.

June 1995 till June 1996 (Probationary Firefighter)

Hired in June the first six weeks I was in the training academy to learn the ins and outs of the department's operations. After graduation I was assigned to my station to begin my OJT. As a Probationary firefighter it was my job to learn the location of all the equipment on the units and how to place it in-service. I was responsible for all station duties such as clean up, Flag up and down, and evening kitchen duties. I was to train, with the assistance of the SR. Firefighter, to pass the practical and written exam for firefighter within the first year.


